Care Management

464 people served

A person-centered assessment, care plan, and supports coordination for people in need of nursing facility level of care. No financial eligibility is required. Donations and cost sharing are encouraged.

Case Coordination and Support

6,573 people served/34,598 hours

Assistance provided to older adults to determine necessary supports, and subsequent linking to and coordination of services to meet their needs.

Information & Assistance

12,956 people served/2,861.72 hours

AIRS Certified Information & Assistance specialists help people connect to programs and services available within the aging network as well as community resources.

Medicare & Medicaid Assistance Program (MMAP)

9,118 clients

Volunteers and paid staff throughout the Region VII AAA planning and service area assist people with Medicare and Medicaid questions, review plan options and help older adults determine if they are eligible for extra help paying premiums and prescription drug costs.

MI Choice Home and Community-based Waiver

1,203 people served/899,790 hours

Provides home and community-based services and supports to people age 65 or older as well as adults age 18 or older with disabilities who meet Medicaid's Nursing Facility Level of Care and financial criteria.

Advocacy and Outreach

1,366 people served/3,493 hours

Agency-wide efforts to identify, connect and assist older adult minority populations including the economically disadvantaged, disabled or members of a minority.

Transportation

368 people served/29,362 hours

Provides rides to doctor appointments and related healthcare as well as routine errands including grocery shopping.

Disease Prevention and Health Promotion

57 people served/135 hours

Provides information and support to older individuals with the intent of assisting them in avoiding illness and improving health status.

Medication Management

753 people served/3,549 hours

Provides direct assistance in managing the use of both prescription and over the counter medication.

1 unit=1 encounter with a participant, 1 meal, or 15 minutes of direct service.

2022 In-Home Services

Chore Services

415 people served/2,243 hours

Provides heavy cleaning including window or wall washing and yardwork. The person must be unable to do the work.

Homemaking

1,012 people served/27,727 hours

Housekeeping, meal preparation, and laundry service for people who are unable to do it on their own.

Home-delivered Meals

5,585 people served/738,022 meals served

Provides a hot and nutritious meal to the home-bound older adult.



Congregate Nutrition

3,321 people served/146,171 meals served

Provides a hot, nutritious meal served in a group setting, often with social activity and fellowship.

Personal Care

396 people served/12,867 hours

Assistance with bathing, dressing and grooming.

Respite

171 people served/8,993 hours

Funds a temporary caregiver as a relief to the primary caregiver.

TSR Respite

12 people served/1,666 hours

Funds a temporary caregiver as a relief to the primary caregiver using

Tobacco Settlement funds.

Unmet Needs/Chore Services

28 people served/28 units

Uses funding to provide non-continuous maintenance tasks as a way of reducing the risk of injury to the older adult.





2022 Community Services

Adult Day Care

68 people served/32,770 hours

Funding supports programs in the community that provide social and rehabilitative activities.

Caregiver Supplemental Services

218 people served/242 hours

Provides goods and services for caregivers when needs cannot be met by traditional funding sources or other community programs.

Caregiver Training

484 people served/3,405 hours

Provides education for family caregivers on topics including dementia, homemaking and personal care.

Elder Abuse Prevention

8 people served/9 hours

Outreach and education designed to prevent self-neglect, abuse, and financial exploitation of older adults.

Evidence-based Programs

154 enrollees/222 completers

Research-based workshops designed to improve health or manage a chronic health condition.



91 people served/1,457 hours

Uses funding to make repairs necessary to keep home safe for the older adult.

Kinship Outreach and Support

56 people served/59 outreach events


Pertinent support and programs for adults age 55 and older who are raising a relative's child.

Funds ombudsmen to help residents of skilled nursing facilities resolve care issues.

Senior Center Operations

79 people served/1,893 hours

Funding supports senior center operations in a number of communities.

Senior Center Staffing

382 people served/5,787 hours

Provides funding to support the wages of senior center staff.

Slip/Fall Safety

387 people served/768 units

Provides funding for elderly homeowners who have a special need for home modification so they can continue living independently.

Utility Assistance

46 people served/45 units

Utility assistance for people who have exhausted all other sources of funding.

Veteran Self-Directed and Community-based Services

2 people served

Service delivery coordination for Veterans referred to Region VII AAA by the Veterans Administration.

Unmet Needs/Home Repair

25 people served/27 units

Friendly Reassurance

1,388 people served

Providing regular contact, through either telephone or in-home visits, with homebound older persons to assure their wellbeing and safety and providing companionship and social interaction.

Care Transitions

638 people served /1,836 hours

Provides interventions to improve transitions via actions designed to ensure the coordination and continuity of health care as patients transfer out of the hospital setting.

Gap Filling/Special Needs

37 people served/112 Units

Providing services and equipment to fill crucial identified needs that are not met by existing informal and formal resources.
